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Parting Shot

Thoughts on the Tragedy in Pittsburgh

ogether we are outraged by the vicious anti-Semitic gunman who killed eleven, including two brothers and a husband and wife, and injured more while they were simply gathered for a Shabbat service and to name a newborn baby at the Tree of Life—or *L'Simcha*—congregation in Pittsburgh on Saturday.

When we gather to worship on Shabbat, we say to each other "Shabbat Shalom!" meaning, "Sabbath greetings/peace." When we rejoice at the birth of an infant, we look ahead filled with optimism and hope, never expecting to witness or experience violence and death at that very moment. Our expectations have been upended, our joy and peace turned to dismay and sorrow.

The Talmud teaches that all Jews are bound, one to the other, an observation never truer than in times like these. We need to be together, to help one another process this tragedy, to stand with one another to confront the hatred that plagues our society, to support one another as we shed tears of grief, and to simply silently hold hands and offer a few prayers.

We share a deep sense of loss for the victims' families and solidarity with the Tree of Life congregation and the greater Pittsburgh Jewish community. We are grateful for the many civic, religious, and community leaders and people of good will of all faiths both locally and throughout the world who have issued statements of support.

This incident occurred within a context. According to the ADL, anti-Semitic incidents in the United States surged 57 percent in 2017, the largest yearly increase since the Jewish civil rights group began collecting data in 1979. It appears that 2018 will see even greater numbers of incidents and violence. Indeed, the hatred we witnessed last year in Charlottesville continues to burn within the hearts of too many in our nation.

Rabbi David Ellenson, the interim president and chancellor emeritus of Hebrew Union College–Jewish Institute of Religion shared this message on Saturday:

We used many of the findings to help guide our Rabbi Search Committee. However, other findings go beyond the scope of the rabbi search. After careful review of the "challenges" and "dreams" data, several major themes came to light. They include: activities, affiliation, leadership, membership, finances, music, ritual/ service, and teen engagement. Without going into too many details, in general, we want more activities, music at more services (if not all), to grow our membership, develop the next generation of leaders, have more educational programs, and offer more for our teens. With the recent decision of our board to reaffiliate with the Union for Reform Judaism, many of these needs may be serviced through their programs. However, to meet the majority of these needs, we have one ultimate challenge: We need more money. To tackle this daunting challenge, we are going to need to do two things: increase our membership and fundraise. So, with that in mind, we invite anyone who is ready to help our shul make its dreams come true to reach out and join the

Tomorrow will be a day of reckoning for the toxicity plaguing our world and how to go about repairing it. Tonight we remember the words of the *Shulchan Aruch* (code of Jewish law) that state that it may not be possible to comfort mourners in the moment of their rawest grief. Instead, we dwell in the valley of tears, recalling our fallen sisters and brothers who were killed in this horrific tragedy. *Tehyenah nafshoteihen tzrurot bi-tzror hahayim*—may the souls of those murdered in Pittsburgh today be bound up in the bond of eternal life.

We held a widely publicized gathering and discussion on Monday night, open to everyone in the community who desired to come in peace. Police Chief Mike Lyle graciously provided extra security precautions for our congregation for this community-wide event. I was glad to see that more than 200 people from our congregation and the community, including the city's leaders and people from local churches and mosques, came to share their thoughts, a poem, a prayer, or simply their silent presence. May be never need to have another meeting like this!



The Temple Beth Shalom Torah Study Group, the Torah Bagel Scholars (TBS), meets year-round to discuss and debate the Bible. We will hold one meeting in November, on the 11th, from 10 AM-12 noon, at the home of Joel Moses, 152 Lincoln Street, Melrose. Our December meetings will be on the 9th from 10 AM-12 noon and 23rd from 1–3 PM, both at the Temple.

At our last meeting, we read First Kings, Chapters 10 and 11, concerning the visit of the Queen of Sheba and the demise of Solomon, who is portrayed as an epitome of wisdom and wealth. We'll pick up at Chapter 12, which begins the story of the breakup of a united kingdom into two states, Israel and Judah.

The group reads from the *The Jewish Study Bible*, the Jewish Publication Society's Tanakh Translation—a clear, straightforward version with excellent footnotes and maps. You need not own a copy. Our approach is to explore the Bible (in English) in light of what historians, archeologists, and other scholars have learned about who/where/ when/what/why this compelling library of books was written.

Melrose Alliance Against Violence (MAAV) Community Mentoring **Program Seeking Volunteer Mentors**



Our newly designed website was up and running in time for the High Holidays thanks to the efforts of Jason Levine. If you haven't already checked it out, please do so by clicking here.


